Call to Prayer


Leader: With hope and love we live each moment faithful to God's call and promise.


Call to Prayer

I call you friend because I have told you everything that I have heard from my Father. John 15:15b

First of all, the stories remind us at the outset that the notion of vocation in its most fundamental meaning is not defined by any specific role or function but something far greater, something written on a vast canvas, a pure gift, with God as its author and life as its subject. In speaking of the notion of God's call to us, we have to realize at the outset we are putting our hands on the pulse of Christian life itself and, indeed, on the life of the human family before God.

"A child of God with rights & duties in the Church"

Cornelia fed this desire for holiness especially through her Epiphany letters. In these she kept before the Society not only the ideal of holiness in the vowed life but also the means by which each one could prove the sincerity of her desires.

Cornelia did "run with ardour" impelled by a great desire to communicate God's loving mercy made visible in the Holy Child. She kindled a fire but hardly stopped to warm herself so eager was she to "increase the love, the devotion for and imitation of the ...virtues of our most sweet Jesus". Her greatest accomplishment, after the founding of her religious family, was that of "vividly unfolding in the course of [her] education the beauty of the morality, charity and truth of the one, Apostolic, Holy, Roman Catholic Church" ... She did this "as far as possible" from her conversion to her death with all her heart, all her mind and all her strength and in the joy and dynamism of her Incarnate Lord (D4; CCl:27). from Informatio, p. 206, 211
