Remember where you were during the first moon landing on July 20, 1969.


What does that moment mean for you now?

About 14 billion years ago a single numinous speck exploded in what is called the Big Bang, an outpouring of matter and energy that is still going on. 
Move your creation symbol to be in the light of the candle.


Look carefully at the pictures from the Hubble telescope.

What does the idea of an "emerging Emmanuel" stir in you?

Incarnation is God with us — in friendship.


Give thanks to God ... Emmanuel.

On the first Christmas day new joy entered our world; may we try by our lives to share joy with others each day.


On the first Christmas day fresh hope entered our word; may we bring hope to those who are heavily burdened.






To explore the meaning of Jesus Christ in evolution, it is helpful to keep several ideas in mind. The first is that creation and incarnation are not two separate events but one process of God's self-giving and self-communication. When we talk about the incarnation, we are also talking about creation. The God who creates is the God who saves because salvation is new creation. Ilia Delio, *The Emergent Christ*

Reflection and Discussion

We will never exhaust probing the meaning of the incarnation: God's desire to share God's self with us; total self-gift: kenosis; becoming human that we might become





In "Lessons from the Book of Nature" Ilia Delio writes: "We are so weighed down by our worries and concerns; we are divided within and without. Jesus asks that we become like little children (Mt 18:3), to live in the awesome present; to surrender in love to a God of incomprehensible love; to see the beauty and goodness of every person and living being, to celebrate the wonder of life."

What we learn from nature is no different from what we learn from the child Jesus...and all children: "...equilibrium, sameness, fixity of species or perfect order is not what we are about. Rather nature [and the holy child] shows signs of playfulness, spontaneity and creativity."

Are we ready for adventure, risk, spontaneity, creativity and novelty? Are you ready to spend time this afternoon in this (child-like) spirit? How?

How would you like to live this part of the incarnational mystery today? Do something this very afternoon in a child-like way — sing, dance, go to the park, PLAY!

I was God's delight day after day, Rejoicing at being in God's presence continually, Rejoicing in the whole world, and delighting in humankind.

Evening - The Second Day

After some "Sabbath time" this afternoon, begin the evening by giving thanks for the enjoyment of doing what you love.

Reflect on the need you might have, each week, of a "day without a "to do" list.

Word

"What do you need to cease from?" Whenever I talk with an individual or a group about Sabbath keeping, I ask that question. "Rushing around and being busy all the time" is the most common answer. The second most common answer: "Multitasking, always trying to do more than one thing at a time." The Sabbath gives us a delightful opportunity to consider where we need to slow down, where our lives have too much motion and activity. Once we have decided when to observe a Sabbath, we need to address two practical questions:

- On my Sabbath, what will I cease from doing?
- What can we do on the Sabbath to experience true rest and draw near to God?

When you think about ceasing from doing some of the activities that usually fill your days, what fears come up?

What might happen, both positive and negative?

Pray about your reactions to the invitation to cease from certain things on your Sabbath. Ask for God's guidance about what is best for you to cease from doing.

Bring your fears to God.

What is it that would enable you to experience resting in God? What helps you to be thankful? To listen to God?



Daytime — The Third Day


Word

God is not a lonely deity at the top of the medieval cosmos, spinning the stars and governing the heavens; rather, God is selfless love poured out by the power of the Spirit as dynamic newness of love desiring a beloved — to make whole, to unify, to evolve toward an infinite depth of love.

Christianity is about future...new life....not historical nostalgia for something lost in the past...We have lost sight of Jesus emerging in history as something new, a new way of being for a new world, a new Big Bang, a new relatedness, making wholes for a whole new future.

To enter **New Being** we must be grasped by it...While the natural world flows more readily into patterns of unity according to its own natural cycles, we humans are dis-



connected. We are created for union, but we have the capacity to disconnect ourselves from wholeness. We can refuse to become whole, to grow, and to enter into relationship with other humans and nonhuman nature. Reflection


