# Educator and Worker for Women's Dignity

Cornelia Connelly's life (1809–1879) was a living parable of Christ's death and Resurrection. She endured death among her children, abandonment by a husband who impulsively sought careers in both the Anglican and Roman clergies, and harassment as her husband tried to have her rejected from the convent life she later found was God's will for her. In an era when most societies refused to educate women, she founded the Sisters of the Holy Child Jesus for the betterment of women. Cornelia is today one of countless prayerful prophets whose legacy continue in her religious family's ongoing education of, and ministry to, children and women.
