Spanish Language Class

There are a number of possibilities to incorporate Cornelia Connelly into Spanish classes. These resources and activities provide opportunities to develop proficiency with the language as well as learn about Cornelia Connelly and the Society of the Holy Child Jesus.

These can be displayed in the classroom or throughout the school.
