Spiritual Dynamos

The first news to be received from our AFRICAN ELECTRONS was as welcome as a breath of Spring. (The students in our big Secondary Schools and Colleges in Nigeria and Ghana are also making every effort to help the thousands of children in the poor bush schools, many of whom are still pagan.) From the Cornelia Connelly Secondary School in Uyo a letter came form Theresa Okure. "We are keeping our promises as Electrons," she writes, "by saying the Our Father with the priest at Mass each day, and offering up an hour's work for the conversion of all Africa."

Another student, Patricia Tagbo, says, "We recently received the Holy Child prayer books and the prayers in it are

very beautiful, especially the prayer for the Beatification of the Servant of God (Cornelia Connelly) which we say often. This is because we wish her to be canonized soon." Very interesting letters came also from Felicia Achdonu and Teresa Obinna.

The Sophomores of St. Mary's High School, Melrose, have a Mission Club that is another little spiritual dynamo. Four of them have written to Electra about their activities and here is a com-

posite of the letters:

"This year the Electrons chose Nigeria for their limited objective because it will soon gain its independence and needs many prayers to combat the threat of Materialism. Our members divided into units of four or five girls with a Leader and a Secretary. Each unit adopted one of the Holy Child Missions in Africa and a special month is dedicated to each one of these Missions. During that month the unit makes an appropriate bulletin board to remind the whole school to pray for their intentions. (For example, January was dedicated to Calabar, February to Lagos, March to Afikpo, etc.)... Each group looks up past issues of The Pylon to learn as much as possible about their Missions ... We thought that the Sisters from our own parish who are now in Africa should be remembered in a special way too, so a special month has been dedicated to Reverend Mother Ronald (Ifuho) and to Mother Mary Kentigern (Takoradi). We also collect things such as rosaries, baby clothes, medals, and holy cards to send to the compound.

"The new members of the Club were given their Electron pins at a beautiful ceremony in the Convent Chapel after Mass on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. All the girls, wearing their blue and white dress uniforms, processed into the Chapel singing 'Little King.' They walked up to the Altar rail and received the pins from Reverend Mother Helena, then they recited the Electron prayer and one to the Immaculate Virgin Mary for the African

Missions.


